**Community Vision – Foster visual, educational, and performing art opportunities that preserve our cultural identities and enhance our quality of life.**

### Art and Education Programs

There are a wide variety of art and cultural educational programs available in the region. Most of the five counties exhibit rich cultural diversity through public events, museums, national monuments, national parks, music festivals, theater, and performing arts. Previous editions of this Index have listed some of the programs located in the region, a sampling of which is offered below. Our challenge in tracking these programs has been that there is no central entity or association that can provide consistent data regarding the types of programs and the numbers of participants.

Fortunately, the Colorado Tourism Office (CTO) has recently launched a study of cultural tourism that addresses issues similar to ours. As part of the study, the CTO is developing indicators that address heritage tourism and our general cultural health. These indicators will address the depth, breadth and quality of cultural and heritage oriented activities and policies, and will be tested in five regions in the state, including southwest Colorado. A final report on this work is scheduled to be available near the end of 2008. ## Historic Preservation

One way we preserve our cultural identities is by recognizing and understanding the physical connections to our past that have created the communities of today. The following indicators track progress that has been made in recognizing and preserving historically important resources and places.

A historic preservation program is an organized effort to assist in recognition and preservation, usually by providing a way to place a property on a register of historically important structures and places. Listing a property on a historic register raises awareness of the property's historic significance and offers the opportunity to plan development in a manner that promotes, rather than destroys, our legacy.

During the time the Index has been tracking this indicator, three (La Plata, Montezuma and San Juan) of the five counties have enacted historic preservation programs, and six communities have created historic preservation programs for their town.

No new data was available on the percentage of recorded sites that are considered eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. This data comes from a report produced by the Colorado Historical Society, which has not yet been updated. Only San Juan and Montezuma Counties have new sites recognized for their historic significance and placed on the National Register. La Plata County and the town of Silverton are in the process of conducting large scale cultural resource surveys for their jurisdictions, which will result in new entries to the database for cultural resources in the region. Bayfield is also in the process of conducting a small cultural resource survey.

There are two state programs that demonstrate the amount of money committed to historic preservation in our region; a state income tax credit based on the costs of preservation work, and a grant program to support historic preservation projects. The figures below show increased investment in historic preservation in the region via the grant program while very little has been done to take advantage of the tax credit program.

Since 1993, over \$11.7 million in state grant funds have been committed to our region via the State Historic Fund. Montezuma County has received the largest amount of funding, probably reflecting the high concentration of archaeological sites and the various public parks and conservation areas in the region. The tax credit program requires administration through the Denver-based office of the Colorado Historical Society, unless local government agrees to provide the administrative service. At this time, only Durango and Pagosa Springs provide administrative services.
